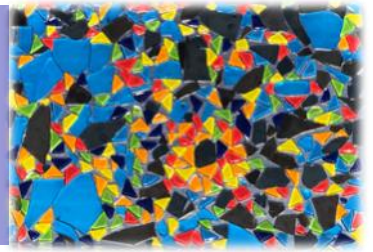

But now, says the LORD...Don't fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name; you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; when through the rivers, they won't sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you won't be scorched and flame won't burn you. Don't fear, I am with you. -Isaiah 43:1-2, 5

We are creatures of habit. We take the same road to work, the same route through grocery stores, and often order the same dishes at our favorite restaurants. But occasionally, our habits get disrupted. Sometimes, road construction alters our path to work. Other times, a store renovation makes our route through the grocery store impossible. And every once in a while, a shortage of a particular food makes our favorite dish unavailable. In these moments, our habits change. But we long for the familiar, comfortable patterns we've developed over time.

Over the last year, we've experienced disruption like never before. Our habits changed, and as a church, we survived. We transitioned into an online-only worship service, converted our meetings to zoom, and found a way to do ministry in the midst of a pandemic. With COVID numbers improving, a target date in the middle of June to open up California, and a return to in-person worship, we will want to return to familiar, comfortable patterns of the past. Unfortunately, the church as we knew it before the pandemic no longer exists.

Approximately 2,700 year ago, God's people experienced disruption. They were removed from their homes and taken to Babylon, into exile. Their world had changed. Recognizing the end of the exile was imminent, God's people longed to return to what they had, but God encouraged something different.

After the verses quoted above, God, through the prophet, says, "*Don't remember the prior things; don't ponder ancient history. Look! I'm doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it?*" -Isaiah 43:18-19

The world that they knew before the exile no longer existed. They didn't know what the future would look like, but God was guiding them every step of the way.

The church we remember before the pandemic, the church we experienced five years ago, and the church you saw when you attended MagPres for the first time, those churches no longer exist.

God was with God's people many years ago, and invited them into a new way of being, not relying on previous patterns, but creating and embracing new patterns.

And God is with us, inviting us to create and embrace new patterns. And we're doing our best to be faithful, from a newly designed sanctuary to a groups model of doing church to a hybrid style of worship, we are faithfully moving into the future God has not only prepared us for, but is walking with us, every step of the way.

When the pandemic started, we offered a phrase that is still true today: "We don't know what the future holds, but we know that God holds the future."

May you be comforted by these words.

A CULTURE OF GENEROSITY From your Stewardship Committee Member, Carol Young

I was born into a "culture of generosity." From birth I was surrounded by my parents, grandmother, family, and church friends who inspired, encouraged, and motivated me on a daily basis. They were living examples of generosity from the heart. My faith is very strong and continues to grow because of them, but also because "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." (Philippians 4:13)

In 2 Corinthians: 9:6-7, the apostle Paul teaches about the joy of giving generously especially when the gift is from the heart filled with compassion. He states, "Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously."..."for God loves a cheerful giver."

I'm a cheerful giver and often humbled, grateful, and filled with hope, faith, and love when I have the chance or opportunity to "get to give," not give to get. I'm not storing up Brownie points for the Lord, I'm thankful I can give freely.

As a young child of 8 years I took the Lord as my Savior in VBS and never looked back.

As a teenager I was active in our Presbyterian Church's Migrate Ministry Program held every Wednesday evening during the summer. We would take, food, clothing, shoes, soap, and toothbrushes as gifts to hand out. our gift of generosity was from our hearts: when interacting with the migrant children and their families through playing softball, singing songs, worshiping together, and praying. It was a win-win for joy and love of God experienced by all.

Other places I learned generosity:

God's special gift to me is a passion for teaching, working, and playing with children.

I went on to teach children for over 40 years, mainly as a K-6 teacher, and

after I retired I went back to teaching as a reading specialist for children struggling with reading. Jeremiah 29:11-12: says," For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." I still teach and tutor part time as a volunteer. What a joy to help someone learn to read!

In 2007 I had the opportunity to join an 18 member missionary team going to South Africa to a small village called Josepha. The villagers had no running water and had to walk or get transportation to bring water to their homes. They also had very little electricity, so at night it was pitch dark. Our mission was to help build, pour, and lay cement for their community -church center and to share and spread the Lord's, faith, hope, and love with them through worship and VBS activities. as a team packed 40 duffle bags with Bibles, clothing, and VBS materials to be given out generously to all that came. One of many of the highlights was reading the parables of Christ and having the stories translated from English to their native language. I would start to read sitting on the grass in the middle of a soccer field and the children and adults would start coming first a few and before I knew it I was surrounded usually by 100-200 listeners for God's word. God was ever present throughout the entire 3 weeks we were there. We as a team were amazed and humbled at how little it took for the children and villagers to be joyful and grateful for our generosity, but our team returned totally blessed with their generosity too.

After my husband of 43 years passed, I returned to travel and help Habitat for Humanity build safe and affordable homes through the following: Alaska, New Zealand, Fiji, Mexico, Kauai, San Diego, and yes, Riverside, CA. Again it was a culture of generosity with both HFH families working and building together with our HFH teams their first home.
